We also would like to welcome new members Joe and Tammy Legenza. They joined at the Catfish Tournament. Welcome.


Micheal reminded everyone that membership renewal comes up in September. A renewal letter will be e-mailed or mailed during September.


Our next meeting will be <u>September 8</u>, at the Lake Fork Deli and Cafe on Hwy 17, beginning at 7:00. See you there

Texas Parks and Wildlife Report

Craig Bonds, Region 3 Director for The Texas Parks & Wildlife, recently presented a report on the health of some of our waterways, and specifically Lake Fork.

Bonds said in1985 the state began the slot limits that have helped produce trophy bass, and the growth in the number of large bass has taken off since 1995 when Florida bass were introduced to the lake. Two-thirds to three-fourths of the fish entered in the ShareLunker program now are Florida bass, he said.

The state conducts surveys of the anglers visiting Lake Fork and it is estimated they spend, \$15 million in the lake area yearly, with a total impact of \$30 million.

Bonds talked about the fishing pressure on Lake Fork, calling it "quite intense." He said there are more than a million angler-hours per year on the lake, which breaks down to 40 angler-hours per acre of lake. The state monitors the fish population beyond just the bass, and over the past six years the weight of some fish has begun to dip a little and that might have an impact in the future.

Then Bonds talked about invasive plants that have created problems in some of the lakes in Texas, as well as elsewhere.

Lake Fork is experiencing some hydrilla issues that can be beneficial to the fishery, but the "biggest threat" to Lake Fork is water hyacinth. It was first spotted in a creek leading into the lake in 1993 and was attacked aggressively. When a moratorium on spraying came into play in 1998 it allowed the vegetation to gain ground and the rapid expansion has the state's attention. Annual treatments of herbicides are currently being used to control the water hyacinth.
